Welcome New Staff

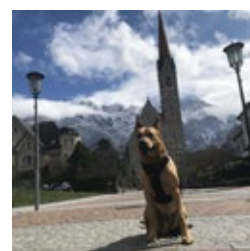
Since our last newsletter we have had a lot of new staff join the PKKPAC team. If you haven't met the new team members yet, here is a little information about each of them.

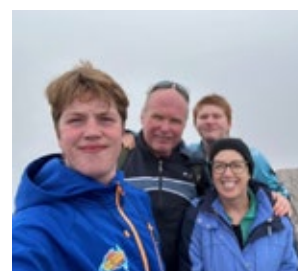
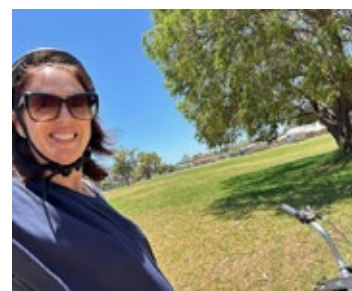


Leeanne Thomas

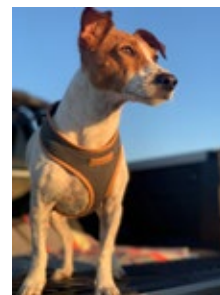


Matt Hankin

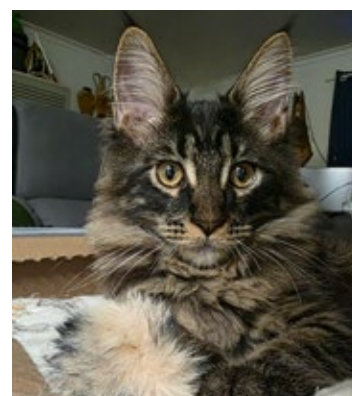


Deloris Satrick

Important Dates and Events

There has been so much happening at PKKPAC over the last few months, here are just a few things that took place very recently and most importantly some information on our big 10 Year Celebration of Native Title Determination.

Community Authorisation and Signing Ceremony

10-Year Celebration of Native Title Determination

The event will be held at the newly renovated Nanutarra Homestead. This will allow us all to visit country, spend time together and to celebrate at House Creek on 2nd of September 2025, which is the actual 10-year anniversary day.

It is important for us all to take some time to share stories and reflect on what has changed over the last 10 years, so that's why we have allowed time for members who have long distances to travel plus we have also included a full day of activities prior to the anniversary date.

A camp will be set up for all members at Nanutarra Homestead. Rooms are being held at Onslow Beach Resort and Elders will take priority for these rooms as there is a limited supply.

YARD MAINTENANCE TIPS



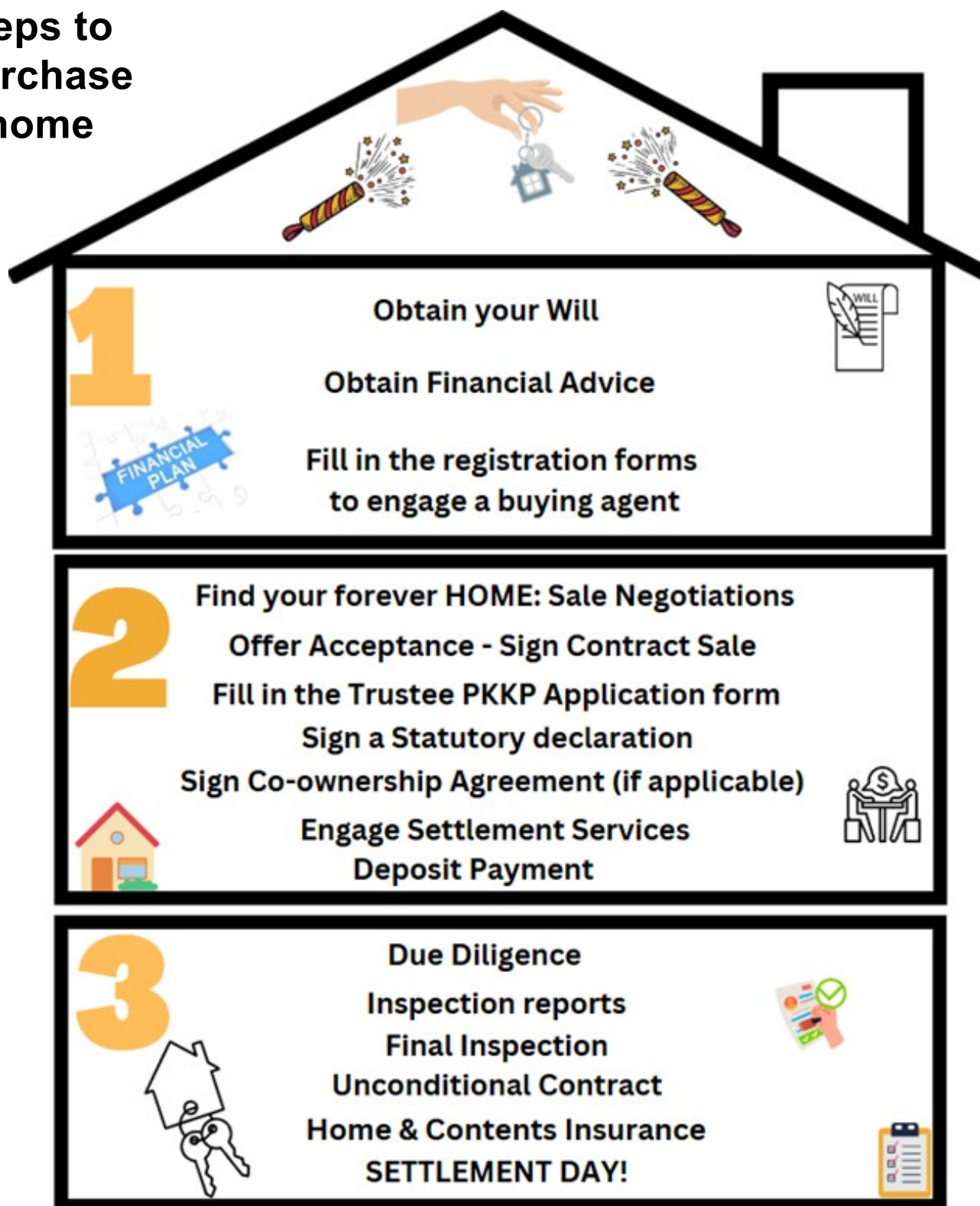
Taking care of your outdoor areas is important for both looks and safety. When plants grow too much, they can attract animals like rodents and snakes, which could lead to bites or spread diseases.

By regularly mowing the lawn, trimming bushes, and clearing away debris, you reduce these risks. Also, it's important to be aware of fire dangers by removing dry leaves and branches, keeping flammable items away from buildings, and making sure outdoor fires are put out properly. A clean and tidy yard helps keep everyone safe.

- Regularly mow lawns and trim bushes to prevent overgrowth.
- Clear away debris to reduce hiding spots for rodents and snakes.
- Remove dry leaves and branches to lower fire risks.
- Keep flammable materials away from buildings and structures.
- Always ensure outdoor fires are controlled and fully extinguished.

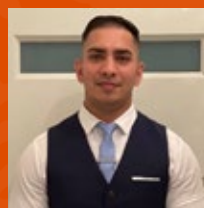

Suicide Prevention Forum

The health and partnerships team has had a busy period, with members from Pinikura and Kurrama traveling to Gadigal country Sydney for the Indigenous Suicide Prevention Forum. Some staff from the Community Outcomes Unit accompanied them, offering ongoing support while gaining valuable insights to bring back to the community.

The members had the opportunity to meet with Hon. Linda Burney, the Black Dog Institute, the Aboriginal Health and Medical Research Council, the Australian Indigenous Psychology Association, Tribal Warrior, Gamay Rangers, Koori Radio, Jeffrey Morgan, and Dante Rodrigues to deepen their understanding of mental health challenges impacting First Nations communities and explore strategies for suicide prevention and to implement as best cultural practices in their communities.

Additionally, the health team has been conducting outreach in Karratha, Perth, Onslow, and Port Hedland to further support our members. Stay tuned for the next health team visit

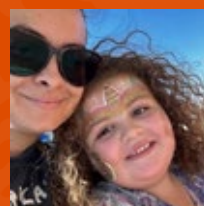

Looking for help with your Drivers Licence?



About the PKKP Driving Assistance Program

The Program is designed to help PKKP members obtain a learners permit or driver's licence and improve road safety by providing training on licensing, road rules, and DOT services.

We can support members and family with upgrading existing licenses (e.g. upgrading from an automatic to a manual licence, specialised truck licences, 4WD training courses and other tickets) and assisting with obtaining the required forms of ID for applications.

Eligibility:

For obtaining a Learners Permit:

- Be old enough (15 years and 9 months)
- Have enough ID documents (e.g. Birth Certificate, Medicare Card, Bank statements, or other).

For upgrading and existing licence:

- Hold a current drivers licence
- Must not have any licence restrictions, unpaid infringements

For obtaining (driving specific) tickets for work purposes:

- Be in employment, or actively looking for work
- A current USI (Unique Student Identifier)
- A current & valid Drivers Licence

Country, Culture and Partnerships

Like every other part of PKKPAC, Country Culture and Partnerships team is moving at a rapid pace. The CMA has been a huge undertaking for everyone, all happening while the rest of the team continue to develop our language resources, the Homestead site and continue with the usual activities like surveys. It never stops!

Co-Management Agreement

During March and April, a series of Community meetings have taken place to update and discuss in detail the progress of Co-management between PKKPAC and Rio Tinto. Several members of both organisations, plus a few from the external stakeholders including project management and legal representatives, delivered a presentation to members in Hedland, Roebourne, Karratha, Onslow, Carnarvon, Newman, Geraldton, Perth and online. These face-to-face and online conversations provided valuable insights into community priorities and helped build shared understanding around the upcoming changes. We're appreciative to all community members who contributed to these sessions—their feedback has been vital in shaping the early stages of our co-management journey.

We're now progressing with the CMA implementation process, and the team is focused on designing training and support resources to help staff transition smoothly. If the changes will affect you, we will be reaching out to you in the coming months.

One of the highlights of the trip was a visit to the Gwoonwardu Mia Gascoyne Aboriginal Heritage and Cultural Centre in Carnarvon, where some of the team saw first-hand, this place that celebrates the culture and country of the five Aboriginal language groups of the Gascoyne Region and how culture can be preserved and presented.

Language Education Workshop in Perth

From January 20-24, representatives of both language groups attended a language education workshop in Perth. This workshop, which was hosted by the PKKP language team staff, aimed to help plan future language education programs that can be rolled out to the wider Pinikura and Puutu Kunti Kurrama communities. We brainstormed ideas about what members want in a language program and made some sample teaching resources (like language posters). We also heard from guest speakers Lola Jones (Aboriginal Languages Teacher Training Program) and Gulwanyang Moran (Gathang activist and language teacher, who developed an online Gathang TAFE course). We even enjoyed a surprise visit from longtime Pilbara linguist Alan Dench, who is currently helping develop a Banyjima course. Outside our workshop venue, we toured the WA Museum to get inspiration from two exhibits on Aboriginal languages and cultures, and we were invited to visit the ABC Perth studio to record episodes for the Word Up series in both languages. UWA PhD Student Katharina Froedrich at PKKP

The language team enjoyed hosting Kat Froedrich, a PhD student from the University of Western Australia and a Forrest Research Foundation scholar, for two weeks in March. Kat will be in Karratha several times throughout 2025, to conduct fieldwork for her Linguistics PhD. Her research explores what linguists have termed 'Aboriginal English' – English used by Indigenous people – as spoken in the Pilbara. Kat looks at how speakers use English to express identity and to speak about different topics, and how they combine it with other languages they know. For her fieldwork, she records yarns with speakers about all kinds of topics. There are only a few studies that look at how Indigenous people in the Pilbara use English. More research on this topic can help us understand how language use varies regionally and how Indigenous communities use their multilingual language resources, and it can paint a more extensive picture of Australia's current linguistic landscape.

Kat is also interning with the language team, learning how our language program runs, attending CLO training sessions and helping us out with some admin and linguistics jobs.

MAKING THE MOST OF OUR RESOURCES

Recently a new area of country was being prepared for Rio Tinto to use as part of their mining operations and our team came up with a great idea. Seeing that the area had a lot of trees as it was near Boolgeeda Creek, we thought rather than just destroy the trees, let's take them and use them at Nanutarra Homestead.

With the help of a Karratha Arborist, and some of Rio Tinto's heavy equipment, we have collected the trunks to use for the creation of Bough Shelters around the site and other purposes, and had the bark and leaves turned into mulch for the restoration of the garden beds. Good thinking and a great way to again make the most of our partnerships.



Nanutarra Homestead

We recently added some pages to our website to share some information on this very important project. Our plan is to regularly add updates and any interesting details or milestones on the project as we work towards our vision of restoring and renovating the property. One of these was a recent visit to the site by Slavin Architects a Perth based firm who have been appointed as part of our team. This was the first visit for most of them to see firsthand the magnitude of the project we have in front of us. The visit was also a chance to sit and discuss the site with our Heritage Committees and get a strong understanding the stories, the site, the heritage and the PKKP people and our connection to the Homestead. 3 of the Directors of Slavin, including Murray Slavin, Stewart Neal and Bill Coe as well as Catherine Rose an Architect from Slavin made the trip to Nanutarra.

Murray said his first impression of the homestead was that “It has a quite stunning presence when you approach it for the first time from the road thanks to its roof form which is quite imposing” and when asked what was it that most excites him about the project he said “The opportunity help ‘close the circle’ that will help bring many families back to country”.

Bill said, “What struck us immediately when we first visited Nanutarra – and listened to the community speak about the place – was the deep connection between Country, culture and the generations who’ve cared for it. We feel privileged to be working with the PKKP community to honour that connection and help shape a place where culture, history and land come together”.

There will be a monthly visit for the next 3 months as we move through the development of the masterplan to the final presentation of that plan. At each stage there will be consultation with the Heritage Committees to usure that our vision for the site is reflected in the plan.

Anyone attending our 10-Year Celebration of Native title will get to see some of changes themselves, but we will make sure we keep you all updated with monthly posts on the Homestead Restoration page of our website.
