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
















































#### WATCH THE DRONE SHOW

The Ranger team did an amazing job of preparing holes for the Eucalyptus Victrix trees that are endemic to this part of the Pilbara.

Each tree was staked and marked with the person's name and date, so that plaques can be placed with the trees in future.

Lots of hard work and laughter, sweat, tears and insect bites, teamwork and determination was shared.


















































































#### Welcome to Our New Staff

### Important Dates and Events

On top of the big 10 Year Celebration of Native Title Determination, here are just a few other things that have taken place at PKKPAC recently.

#### **Healthy Country Planning Training Darwin**

Congratulations to the rangers who attended our Healthy Country Planning training at the beautiful Riyala (outside Darwin) at the start of July.

The five-day live-in course is an intensive introduction to the Healthy Country Planning framework, an adaptation of the Conservation Standards, specifically for use in community contexts where cultural and natural values are deeply connected.

For this training participants worked in five teams, each led by Indigenous corporations or land managers who brought their own case studies to focus on for the week. Groups applied all elements of the Healthy Country Planning cycle to these live scenarios, with leadership and guidance from the Indigenous teams who are at different stages of their own plan development, delivery or review. Applying learning processes to tangible scenarios allows participants to challenge the theory and cement the concepts.

At the end of the week, each team presented their plan back to the broader group, in some very funny and moving presentations.

They had the privilege of being welcomed to country by Wulna Traditional Owners Lynette and Tarisma from Pudakul who we also visited mid-week for a generous and insightful cultural tour – a highlight of the week for many.

It is an intense week of sharing, learning, laughter and personal and professional growth, which is only possible with the enthusiasm, questions, openness and hard work of the participants. Thank you all for making it a memorable and rewarding week.

#### **PKKP Attends FNCEN**

The First Nations Clean Energy Symposium was held on Thursday 14 and Friday 15 August at the Sunshine Coast Convention Centre, QLD. It was run by the First Nations Clean Energy Network (FNCEN). It was attended by Gary Dean, Kaitlyn Hayes (Community Director of PKKP Enterprises - Puutu Kunti Kurrama), and Priscilla Jilba (Community Director of PKKP Enterprises - Pinikura) pictured here.

By all reports the Symposium was well organised and informative with key presentations on

- First Nations need to lead the clean energy revolution and are central to decisions about their lands, resources, and futures.
- Breakthrough moments: implementing the First Nations Clean Energy best practice principles to ensure co-design, partnership, ownership and participation of First Nations peoples
- Lessons in negotiation: strong agreements, negotiation strategies, co-ownership pathways that uphold sovereignty, deliver real benefits, and ensure free, prior and informed consent.
- Better housing for a changing climate: improving housing quality and energy efficiency.
- First Nations landscape: the context of climate change
- Getting decarbonisation right: models emerging between government utilities and First Nations communities
- Policy impacting people: government needs to deliver on First Nations participation and benefit sharing
- Cultural heritage: taking control of cultural mapping,, risk assessment and land access to ensure cultural heritage is respected, protected and prioritised in clean energy planning and delivery.
- Building energy justice; what it is; challenges to be overcome
- Making equity equitable: First Nations equity participation in clean energy projects

Some 450 people attended the gathering of First Nations leaders, Traditional Owners, communities, government, unions, academics, community organisations, industry and allies driving real outcomes for First Nations in Australia's clean energy transition.

This Symposium was about the doing — about showing up, sharing knowledge, learning from each other, working on the challenges and building on the work we are already doing together. There is a lot for us to consider when it comes to clean energy and the future of not only PKKP Country, but also on a global scale.



## Country, Culture and Partnerships

#### **Update on CMA Implementation**

We're pleased to share that we've now entered Phase 3 of the CMA implementation, with great progress being made across the board. A major milestone has been the rollout of new functionality on our ESS software, including calendar functionality and easier-to-manage task lists. This upgrade is making it simpler and more efficient for our heritage team to manage and organise surveys – as we anticipate the number of heritage surveys to rise within the coming years. To support the rollout, we've recorded a suite of training videos and are preparing a user guide – ensuring both existing staff and new starters have the tools and information they need to confidently use ESS.

We're also focused on building capability across our stakeholder groups. A three-day training program is in development for Traditional Owners, designed to improve their experience when working alongside heritage consultants, with a focus also on safety in the field. At the same time, we're in the process of creating new training materials for consultants, staff, members, and proponents, to ensure everyone understands their role in the comanagement journey.

Finally, we've begun work on a robust succession plan for both members and corporate staff, with a long-term strategy being shaped through collaboration with key stakeholders to support continuity and leadership into the future.







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## Language Team Updates

#### **PULiiMA Conference**

In August, the Language Team, along with Mitchell Drage, had a wonderful time at the PULiiMA Indigenous Language and Technology Conference, held in Darwin. We gave two presentations: in one, we shared our process of training Community Language Officers; in the other, we discussed the benefits of research into other languages when building up a language database. PULiiMA is the main conference for Indigenous language work in Australia, one one of the main conferences of this type in the world, so this was a very exciting opportunity for our team.

We also learnt heaps from other language programs around Australia and the world, and we were able to strengthen our networks with language centres and universities.
